Tucked off a main road in Stow, Carver Hill Orchard is truly a hidden treasure. Seasonally, it offers an old-time applepicking and produce experience. Today, this working farm and apple cider mill property is more than 100 years old.

Yet, the farm's history dates back nearly 285 years to a sawmill and tannery on Elizabeth Brook, the early lifeblood of Stow. This scenic land abounds with natural history, including the historic mill dam and pond, a drumlin and an incredible glacial rock formation.

A tour of this 80-acre orchard led by the Stow Conservation Commission, Stow Historical Society, Stow Historical Commission, and Stow Conservation Trust will afford visitors a unique opportunity to immerse themselves in local history, conservation and geology. Participants should wear comfortable walking or hiking shoes.



STOW'S 2nd HIDDEN TREASURE

TOUR of the circa 1760 Gates/Whitney Homestead – by RSVP only



The Newman family is opening their historic home to local historic societies on Wednesday, May 17, 2017.


The Gates/Whitney house, which was built between 1744 and 1760, sits on land deeded to Thomas Gates in 1681. It was one of the twelve original lotts of the Pompositticut

Plantation. When Stow became a town on May 16, 1683, Thomas Gates was Stow's first Constable.

The house was passed down through several generations of the Gates family. In 1806 Lucy Gates, the great-great-granddaughter of Thomas Gates, married Moses Whitney. In 1825 Moses purchased this property, therefore, the beginning of the Gates/Whitney Homestead. Moses and Lucy had two daughters, Mary and Lucia. Their daughters married their Harvard Whitney cousins. Mary married James

> Fordyce Whitney in 1834 and Lucia married his brother, Edwin Whitney, in 1841. Mary and James removed to Albany, NY, where he was a prominent grocer. Their seven children were born in Albany. Edwin, a lawyer, and Lucia lived in Stow. They moved into the NEW Whitney homestead on Great Road, which had been built by Moses and Lucy in 1843.

Between 1855 and 1860 James Whitney's business was destroyed by fire in Albany. At this point the family returned to Stow and lived in the Gates/Whitney house. Over the years this house has had many additions. It is thought that the wing's second story was added when the James Whitney family returned to Stow.



The Gates/Whitney Homestead has a storied history. It sits on an original lott and also has a connection to the Underground Railroad. This celebrated home is presently for sale.
