schoolhouse to experience Stow's early school days.



Alexander Hamilton and Stow: The Founding of a New Nation

The American Revolution set the colonies on the long and difficult path of gaining independence and forming a new country. On the national level, Founding Father Alexander Hamilton played a key role in the Revolutionary War. Later, he was instrumental in getting the Constitution ratified and in establishing a stable, strong, and prosperous United States.



At the local level, the military, political, and economic developments that occurred on the national stage during this period are clearly echoed in Stow. This presentation will examine America's founding documents and Stow historical records to provide evidence of Stow's active participation in the events of this era.

A plan of the Town of Stow taken in October 1794 Scale 200 rods to an Inch Jabex Brown Surveyor




