




The SHS reported that, "The area referred to as 'Whitman's Corner' is bounded by hills and bodies of water – all still present today.

- There is *Birch Hill* on the North.
- Gleasondale is on the South, which involves going up and over *Honey Pot Hill*.
- To the East is the area over the Assabet River, and up Barton Road to *Boon's Hill* arriving at Lake Boon."

#### The Women of Whitman's Corner

#### **Sudbury Road**

#### **Maud L. Whitney Ferguson**



- 1862-1924
- Born in Buffalo, NY
- 1897 married Thomas Wells Ferguson in Milwaukee, WI
- Lived at 144 Sudbury Rd from 1915 to 1926
  - Thomas worked for as a purchasing dept, machine shop
- This house was once The Whitman Tavern built pre-1830 – owned by Capt. Edward Whitman
  - This land has been used as a dairy, poultry, and fruit farm.



SHS - ca. late 1800's

- Thomas W. Ferguson was the 8<sup>th</sup> owner.
- 1919, April 4: The family of T. W. Ferguson are at the home place at Whitman's Crossing. (Hudson News-Enterprise, page 8)
- 1919, May 9: Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Ferguson are entertaining his mother and sister from Milwaukee, Wisconsin. (Hudson News-Enterprise, page 8)

- Today this is Honey Pot Hill Orchards.
- The name Honey Pot Hill Farm originally belonged to the farm of Jonathan Priest until about 1912, when Will Parker bought it. (Edith Leland Swaney Parker story on page 6)

#### **Helen Elizabeth Hearsey Ferguson**

Kerguson Kelen H.

- 1894-1987
- Born in Medford, daughter of Charlotte and Charles A. Hearsev
- 1919 June 6: Helen reelected teacher at Newton H. S.
- 1919, Nov 24: married Whitney T. Ferguson, son of Thomas and Maud Ferguson
- 1920 Helen and Whitney lived with his parents and siblings at 144 Sudbury Road. Whitney was a farm laborer.







#### **Charlotte F. Saul Hearsey**





- 1886 married Charles A. Hearsey
- The mother of Helen Hearsey Ferguson
- The family most likely built their house

at 387 Gleasondale Rd in 1904-1905, where Charles farmed.



1917: Worked with the Red Cross Unit in Hudson (Crowell, page 79)

1918, May 17: Treasurer of the Stow Civic Club (Hudson News-Enterprise, page 5)

1918, June 21: On the Grange's dinner committee to entertain soldiers from Camp Devens (Hudson News-Enterprise, page 4)

#### Many a Stow youth, who biked down HEARSEY'S HILL, had a STORY.

"I rode my bike down Hearsey's Hill many a time going to the Gleasondale School. It was a great ride going down...feet off the pedals and let 'er rip!! Getting back up the hill on the way home was another matter entirely. It was a hard pump and often I ended up walking the bike to the to the top. No gears on my fat tire bike back then.

"The wildest part of the ride was making the turn on the curve at the bottom of the hill. If you got into the sand on the edge of the road it was a complete wipeout with skinned legs and torn pants."




#### Nellie C. Wade Murdock

- 1870-1931
- Born in Bridgewater
- 1907 married Charles H. Murdock whose farm was on 61 Sudbury Road
- Son, Charles Curtis Murdock, was born Dec. 1909
- "Beyond the Woodman's was the only other house, that of the Murdock's which all the kids were afraid to pass although I know nothing Mr. Murdock ever did to get this reputation. They had one son who went to the Gleasondale School." (Thomas W. Ferguson's Recollections, a Stow Historical Society Research

#### **Emma May Parker**



- 1876-1973
- Born in Stow, the daughter of James Lloyd Parker and Frances E. Goding
- Treasurer Methodist Episcopal Church
- Ran the family farm store on 310 Sudbury Road
- Family farmed, had greenhouses, cider mill, icehouse...
- 1936 married Edward Scott
- She lived 96 yrs, 7 ms, and 24 ds.

#### Elizabeth Gillespie Bolam



musdock Nellie

- 1851-1923
- Born in Paisley, Scotland, arriving in the US in 1857
- 1879 married George Bolam, who farmed near 218 Sudbury Road
- Naturalized in 1879
- President of the Ladies' Aid of the Methodist Episcopal Church, Gleasondale
- Superintendent of the primary department of the Sunday School, ME Church
- For many years, a member of the Grange, serving as lecturer
- From 1912-1923 she had been in poor health


# Registered Oct 22, 1920

#### **Edith Leland Swaney Parker**



- 1872-1921
- Born in Lubec, ME, the daughter of George W. Swaney and Laura J. Newman
- 1896 married in Stow William Henry Parker, a farmer on 98 Sudbury Street
  - Wm Henry was the son of James Lloyd Parker and Frances E. Goding
  - Sister-in-law of Emma May Parker

#### **Laura J Newman Swaney**



- 1853-1953
- Born in West Lake, ME
- 1871 married George William Swaney
- **Mother of Edith L. Swaney Parker**
- 1919, Jan 10: President of M.E. Church's Ladies' Aid
- 1920: George was a wool sorter at the Gleason Woolen Mill
- Lived 100 years



- 1860-1924
- Born in Jay, ME
- 1879 married Herbert P. Underwood, fruit farmer,
   170 Whitman Street
- 1919, July 18: Walter and Arthur Underwood arrived home from overseas (Hudson News-Enterprise, page 7)
- 1919, August 1: Active in the Ladies' Aid of the M.E. Church (Hudson News-Enterprise, page 5)
- Member of the Stow Woman's Association, the Stow Circle Club, and the Grove School Association

#### Lillian N. Newsham Underwood



- D1897-1987
- Born in Allston
- 1919-1920 married Arthur L. Underwood, the son of Hannah and Herbert Underwood, upon his return from France (WWI)
  - Arthur was a laborer on his father's fruit farm.
- Lived at 170 Whitman Street
- 1924: Sergeant-at-Arms pf the American Legion Auxiliary in Stow
- Daughter-in-law of Hannah Underwood

#### **Emma Ashworth Priest**



- 1872-1949
- Born in Shaw, England
- Immigrated in 1887; naturalized in 1890
- 1892 married Lyman F. Priest, fruit farmer, 149 Whitman Street

The peach orchard at Lyman Priest's farm has been attracting visitors from all directions during this past week since it has been in bloom.

at Homestead Farm were visited, then a call at the Lyman F. Priest place, where his apple and peaches were viewed with (Hudson News-Enterprise, page 1) great interest. Mr. Priest's method of grading claimed attention.

- Born in Batsford, England
- Immigrated in 1894; naturalized in 1900
- 1899 married John H. Phipps

- Fruit Farm on 160 Whitman Street
- Daughter-in-law of Emma Priest



#### Vera A. Warren Cole

Cole, Vera a. Warren

- 1889-1981
- Born in Montreal, Canada
- Naturalized in 1905
- Her brother, Wilfred G. G. Cole, bought the farm at 149 Sudbury Road, which was also called Lake Boon Road in 1921.
  - 1897 graduate from Harvard College
  - Head of a tutoring school in Cambridge
  - "I have a farm in the country and enjoy raising apples and poultry." (Harvard College Class of 1897, Twenty-fifth Anniversary Report, 1897-1922. October 24, 1919

The family of Mr. Cole at Whitman's Crossing had a narrow escape from fire recently. An oil heater was left burning in the hall during the night, and streaming up filled the house with smoke, and melted some parts of the stove.
