# Author of Our Beloved Kin: A New History of King Philip's War

Tracing Mary White Rowlandson's Path: From Lancaster/Nashaway to Kwinitekw, the Connecticut River

#### Meet Our Guest Speaker:



**Lisa Brooks** is Associate Professor of English and American studies at Amherst College. She is a writer, literary scholar and historian, and she also authored *The Common Pot: The Recovery of Native Space in the Northeast*. She was the John L. Loeb Associate Professor of the Humanities at Harvard University before going to Amherst in 2012. She recently received the Whiting Foundation Public Engagement Fellowship for 2016-2017. While completing her undergraduate degree, she worked on aboriginal rights and land preservation cases with the tribal office at the Abenaki Nation of Missisquoi. As an emerging writer, she was mentored through Wordcraft Circle of Native Writers and Storytellers.

In Our Beloved Kin, Lisa Brooks recovers a complex picture of war, captivity, and Native resistance during the "First Indian War" (later named King Philip's War) by relaying the stories of Weetamoo, a female Wampanoag leader, and James Printer, a Nipmuc scholar, whose stories converge in the captivity of Mary Rowlandson.

This program is sponsored by a collaborative effort among the Bolton Historical Society, the Stow Historical Society, the Lancaster Historical Society, Freedom's Way, and the Seven Bridge Writers' Collaborative.
