
100th Anniversary of the 19th Amendment: Women's Suffrage





Eighty-five of the registered women had at least one relative registering, too, whether it was a grandmother, mother, daughter, sister, cousin, aunt, niece, or in-law. There were numerous family groups. For example:



Susan Ann Gates Peck registered to vote October 30, 1895

Mrs. William Henry Peck, widowed in 1873 1841-1922

Susan Gates Peck registered to vote on October 30, 1895, so that she could cast her vote in the November Massachusetts election, which included the Massachusetts referendum to adopt women's enfranchisement in the state.

In the fall of 1895 voter registration was open to women across the state.

Seven women registered in Stow on October 30, 1895.

The voters in MA overwhelmingly defeated this 1895 referendum. The MA suffrage organizations continued to lobby for women's suffrage in MA through 1915, when the suffrage referendum was again defeated. At this point, they turned their energies to campaign for national enfranchisement.

Susan's 1895 registration automatically included her with the 1920 registrants. Up until 1920 she could have voted for school committee members.

There are no known Stow records for these early voting dates.

Susan Gates and her children, John, Samuel, and Willena, all attended Stow's West School.

Willena Peck graduated from medical school in 1900.

Willena practiced medicine in Stow and in the state of Mississippi and Alabama, where she was school physician at the University of Montevallo. "Susan Ann (Gates) Peck was my great grandmother. She certainly would have registered to vote because she was a political person. Her sons and daughter were also political people and instilled in their offspring (none for Willena) the sense of duty to vote...Republican!! Susan saved everything and I am sure that she was instrumental in having her daughter-in- law, Lillian Lewis, register to vote, too. Lillian's sisters, Lena and Jessie, were not married but they were certainly in tune with the suffrage movement."

Did Susan Gates Peck vote in 1920 federal election?

- The Hudson News-Enterprise weekly articles answered this question.
- The news accounts between May 10, 1918 and December 26, 1919, plus September 10, 1920 gave the Society the answer.

June 7, 1918, page 7

Mrs. Susan Peck and Dr. Willena Peck returned from the South this week and will spend the summer at their home here.

September 13, 1918, page 5

Mrs. Susan Peck and Dr. Willena Peck have returned South for the winter.

May 9, 1919, page 2

Mrs. Susan Peck and Dr. Willena Peck arrived home from the South last week, and greeted friends Memorial day.

June 6, 1919, page 8

Mrs. Susan Peck and Dr. Willena Peck are expected home from the South the last of this month.

Mrs. Julia Crandall and Miss Adina Crandall were the guests of Mrs. Susan Peck and Dr. Willena Peck, last week. Wednesday evening, Mrs. Julia Crandall's and Mrs. Charles Crandall's birthdays were celebrated by a family party held at Mrs. Susan Peck's.

Miss Dorothy E. Peck, Miss Ruth Peck and Miss Louise Harriman underwent operations, when tonsils were removed, Saturday, at the Clinton hospital. Dr. Willena Peck was present and has charge of the patients, who came to their homes, Sunday, and are getting along well.

Hudson News-Enterprise weekly articles between January 2, 1920 to August 6, 1920 were not read. The microfiche was fast-forwarded to August 6, 1920, searching for information about women's voter registration.

The Hudson News-Enterprise had no coverage of the June 25, 1919 Massachusetts ratification of the 19th Amendment.

September 10, 1920

Dr. Willena and Mrs. Susan Peck have closed their summer home and returned to Montevallo, Ala.

SUSAN GATES PECK did not vote in the November 1920 election.
